

The Government have acknowledged this week that it is not possible for all pupils to return to school before the end of term in less than six weeks' time. Headteachers have been given the responsibility to decide what is manageable and safe for each school and its community. Every school is unique and has its own set of circumstances. It is always very tricky to draw comparisons, especially when pupil numbers, class organisation and staffing levels vary widely. We are working under difficult circumstances and we also appreciate that these continue to be anxious times for all families around the country. Please be assured that we are doing our very best for all members of the school community and as reflective practitioners we discuss and review our plans on a regular basis. We are currently waiting for further quidance from the DfE to help us plan until the end of term.

The children who are in school have been getting used to being at school again. They are having short sessions of Maths and English and we are doing a lot of PSHE and spending as much time outside as we can. This is certainly not 'normal' school.

Home learning

Currently for home learning we are directing you towards BBC Bitesize Daily for structured Maths and English lessons. There is a Maths and English lesson for every weekday for Year 1 to Year 6. These are planned lessons covering the National Curriculum. They often include a video starter and then have two or three written activities. There are also weekly Science lessons for each year group and a variety of other foundation subject lessons. This is what we are now advising you to do for planned activities.

Talking to children about diversity and anti-racism

Not Like The Others by **Jana Broecker**, a book about diversity, acceptance, understanding and kindness. **Sulwe** by **Lupita Nyong'o**, a book about colourism featuring a girl Sulwe who is darker than everyone in her family and school and who learns true beauty comes from within.

All Are Welcome by Alexandra Penfold and Suzanne Kaufman following a group of children through a day at school where diversity is strength.

I Am Human: A Book of Empathy by Susan Verde which is about a celebration of empathy and compassion, encouraging children to see themselves as part of one big imperfect family millions strong.
