

### **Attendance and Punctuality**

We strive to put our pupils at the heart of everything we do. Their education and well-being are vitally important. It is really hard for children to learn and flourish if they are not in school. Our Attendance Improvement Officer has recommended that we review attendance every four weeks. Mrs McGill will be speaking to the parents of any children who fall below 90% attendance over half a term. Not only do children miss essential learning if they have extended periods of time off school they can also find it harder to maintain friendships. We understand that children get ill and that they sometimes need time off for special family events.

Currently we do not impose fines for poor attendance, however in our safeguarding role we must consider the best interests of all of our pupils – in the future for cases of persistent absence we will be asking for proof of doctors' appointments and prescriptions. In extreme, individual cases the Governing Body may consider imposing fines to ensure children receive the education they are entitled to and deserve.

We are also looking closely at punctuality. If your child is late twice or more in a week you will receive a letter from the school. If the situation continues Mrs McGill will call you into school in order to discuss ways to improve your punctuality. We understand that lateness is sometimes unavoidable and that there are exceptional situations, however we also know that persistent lateness is detrimental to a smooth start to the day. Not only does the late child feel embarrassed and miss essential learning, their late arrival also disrupts the rest of the class. Moving forward, if children arrive after 9.20am they will be marked as U – unauthorised rather than L – late.

As a school we are working very hard to instil the values of respect, responsibility and resilience, your assistance with this is invaluable.

### Playground

The fitness equipment is now fully up and running. The children are really keen to use it. They have been waiting patiently for their go, lining up beautifully along the safety fence and moving really carefully onto the equipment. Our vision for the playground was that we would have a variety of areas for children to spend their free time and we are really pleased with the results. We have the main playground with sports fencing to prevent balls going out into the car park (well, most of them). We have our quiet garden area where the children have opportunities to grow flowers, fruits and vegetables or just sit quietly. The area beyond the new small fence is also a calm zone. There is table for children to sit and draw at and the new fence is a physical indicator for the children that they need to get ready to re-enter school. This helps the children to start their learning again calmly after being outside. The fence is also there for safety reasons, to remind children that the undercover area is place area for walking, not running.

The local community are also free to use the playground out of school hours. We do ask that people stay in the main playground/field area and don't go thorough gates into the Reception/Cygnets garden or the undercover area.

### Class 1 Australia Fundraising

Class 1 are very concerned about wild animals caught up in the Australian bushfires. They would like to raise some money for the WWF koala appeal and will be doing a sponsored obstacle course. Amanda Ledster has kindly agreed to make one of her excellent cakes, which we will raffle at the parent assembly on Friday 31st January. Raffle tickets will be on sale for £1 each in the school office from Monday 27th January.
